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# Furniture and Other Non-Medical Items in Patient/Resident/Client Care Areas

## Purpose

This document is to provide Infection Prevention and Control (IPAC) recommendations for all healthcare settings when planning and choosing **furniture and non-medical items**; surfaces and finishes in **patient care areas.** 

Recommendations apply to new purchases of furnishings, surfaces, finishes, loaned, borrowed, or **donated equipment** (see additional recommendations).

It is essential that all materials and non-medical items purchased in healthcare settings meet IPAC requirements for cleaning and disinfecting. This applies to all furnishings and non-medical items, surfaces, and finishes.

## **Decision Making**

- Review Appendix A: Key Questions: Furniture and Non-Medical Item Selection
   Checklist
- Consult with Interior Health (IH) stakeholders to determine whether purchases meet essential criteria prior to decisions on furniture and non-medical item purchases.
  - Stakeholders include: IPAC, Capital Procurement and Equipment, Environmental Services (EVS), and Workplace Health and Safety (WH&S).
- Choose the most appropriate furniture and non-medical items for the space and intended purpose. Weigh the risks and benefits associated with the surfaces, fabrics, finishes, cleaning and disinfection and/or rinsing instructions and potential noncompliance with manufacturer's instructions for use (MIFU).
- Confirm that all new or replacement furniture is commercial grade and meets IH
  requirements including fire codes and safety standards.
- Furniture should be inspected and confirmed to be safe for use before it is accepted into the facility
  - E.g., clean and intact; free of bed bugs or other pests; TV, electronics and appliances meet safety standards. Items that are soiled or in disrepair should be discarded.



#### **IPAC Recommendations:**

For areas with moderate to high risk of environmental microbial contamination. This includes all clinical areas such as patient care areas, waiting rooms, clinical offices, and public spaces in healthcare settings.

#### **General Principles:**

- Identify and discard **or** remove and repair damaged items that can no longer be cleaned and disinfected.
- Replace worn, stained or torn items as these items may support the growth of microorganisms.
- Do not move furnishings from clinical to non-clinical areas and vice versa. Do not accept donations of used furniture and other non-medical items for use in patient care areas.

#### Furniture/non-medical items

Surfaces and finishes that are:

- Compatible with approved hospital grade cleaner and disinfectant products. Review MIFU.
- Easy to clean and disinfect and can withstand repeated cleaning and disinfecting without causing damage or voiding warranty
- Seamless and without crevices
- Non-porous with smooth surfaces
- Fluid resistant

**DO NOT** select surfaces that are difficult to clean and disinfect such as:

- Carpet
- Cork boards
- Paper and natural fibre products
- Woven fabrics and fabric-covered products
- Wood and wood-based products with veneers or painted surfaces
- Surfaces that may become damaged or wear with repeated cleaning and disinfection

#### **Fabric**

Fabric used for patient care, or for use on patients should be single patient use or washable between multi-patient uses (e.g., Slings, Holter monitor covers, mobility belts, etc.)

- Resistant to tears, punctures, stains, and damage
- Resistant to microbial growth (consult with IPAC to determine antimicrobial claims)
- Easy to maintain and repair



#### Furniture/non-medical items

Items that require IPAC consultation prior to purchase (not an exclusive list):

- Desks and ergonomic accessories
- Seating, including built-in benching
- Over bed tables and bedside
- Bedside tables
- Carts and trolleys
- Paper towel and other dispensers
- Flooring and finishes
- Televisions and accessories
- Storage cabinets
- Paper towel and toilet paper dispensers
- Window treatments

#### **Definitions**

**Non-medical items** are objects in the patient area or healthcare setting that are <u>not</u> medical devices, i.e., used to assess, diagnose, or treat a patient.

**Patient** means anyone who receives or has requested care or services from Interior Health including residents, and clients.

**Patient/resident/client care area** means anywhere in a healthcare setting (e.g., acute care, long term care, ambulatory, supportive living, respite care, urgent care, etc.) where a patient may be or where direct care is provided. This includes nursing stations, waiting rooms, patient lounges and common areas.

**Donated furniture or equipment** means a gift of an item, often used, and no longer required by a family's loved one (e.g., wheelchairs, scooters, recliners, speciality beds and/or mattresses, etc.).

**Furniture and other non-medical items** means objects in the patient area or healthcare environment that are located in patient areas or patient environment and/or accessible to patients and are *not* medical devices that are used to diagnose or treat a patient.

**Commercial grade** means furniture and non-medical items that are graded using industry standards to meet fire safety standards and other applicable manufacturing, installation, and operational standards.

**Capital Procurement and Equipment** means the department responsible for facilities-related resources and includes the Furnishings and Equipment Planning and Space Management teams. These teams provide expertise for selecting furnishings within commercial and healthcare facilities conforming to the require
