Novel Opioid Use Disorder Interventions in the Fentanyl Era: From Bench to Bedside to Community

What: This presentation will examine cutting-edge clinical opioid withdrawal management and opioid agonist treatment protocols developed to treat patients using unregulated fentanyl and its analogues. It will also explore non-opioid adjunct medications and molecular targets to reduce opioid tolerance, as well as the use of medical devices and digital health apps to facilitate the treatment of opioid use disorder. Who: **Emily M. Janke, PhD**, has served as the inaugural director of the Institute for Community & Economic Engagement since 2010 at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. She is a tenured full professor in the Peace and Conflict Studies department where she contributes to its community-engaged scholarship through teaching, research, and service. As a scholar-administrator, Emily has advanced practice and scholarship in the areas of interdisciplinary and transdisciplinary scholarship with diverse and inclusive teams; the equitable treatment of community-engaged scholarship in workload, hiring, and promotion and tenure policy and practices; strategic efforts to track and monitor community engagement and public service within and across institutions; pluralistic and open scholarly communications; resident-level community boards to support respectful institutional engagement; and the use of restorative practices in interpersonal, intergroup, and organizational culture.

Who: Dr. Khara Sauro is an Assistant Professor and Ohlson Professor of Head & Neck Health, in the Department of Surgery, with cross appointments in the Departments of Community Health Sciences and Oncology. Dr. Sauro's research focuses on improving the quality and safety of care for patients with cancer, especially those who undergo major surgical treatment, to optimize the health of these patients. Dr. Sauro has a particular interest in leveraging routinely collected administrative data to evaluate the quality of healthcare and the effectiveness of implementing interventions to improve healthcare delivery. She uses diverse methodologies (qualitative and quantitative) to ask and appropriately answer clinically relevant research questions

Cultural Safety in Healthcare: Past, Present, and Future Perspectives with Simon Brascoupé

Date: Thursday, **May 16th, 2024 (PST)**

What: This presentation examines cultural safety, initially championed by Māori nurse Irihapeti Ramsden in the 1990s, and its global dissemination across healthcare systems. It explores its historical evolution, present application, and future prospects, considering spiritual, physical, mental, and emotional dimensions through a Two-Eyed-Seeing approach. From Indigenous knowledge perspectives, it scrutinizes its implications for professional growth, relationships, and future generations. Drawing from Western and Indigenous paradigms, it analyzes humility, the Seven Sacred Teachings, and ethical spaces. The presentation envisions the future of cultural safety, integrating diverse theories through frameworks like Two-Eyed-Seeing, fostering inclusive and collaborative healthcare environments.

Who: **Simon Brascoupé**, Anishinabeg/Haudenauasnee – Bear Clan, holds roles that allow him to contribute to cultural safety and healthcare efforts. Currently serving as President and CEO at the First Nations Education Administrators Association, Brascoupé brings his experience and expertise to the forefront. With a background in sociology and anthropology, Brascoupé has pursued academic positions at Carleton University, McGill University, and Trent University. He holds a B.A. and M.A. from the State University of New York at Buffalo, where he also pursued doctoral studies
