Program and service highlights

Inpatient virtual care pilot making positive strides

Six months into B.C.'s first virtual inpatient-care pilot, staff at Cariboo Memorial Hospital (CMH) are well into a rhythm. What began as an innovative solution to physician shortages in 2024 has evolved into collaborative and ongoing inpatient care. Thanks to the support of the virtual care model, physician staffing at CMH has now stabilized, allowing the hospital to gradually return to more in-person coverage. Patients continue to express high levels of satisfaction with their care, whether provided virtually or face-to-face.

Language pilot focuses on providing culturally safe emergency care

Interior Health is partnering with the Tŝilhqot'in, Dãkelh Dené and Secwépemc Nations and Provincial Health Services Authority (PHSA) provincial language services to co-develop and pilot a culturally safe and appropriate Indigenous interpreter program at CMH. This initiative will provide Indigenous-led language support for community members accessing emergency services and begins in November 2025.

Connections team reduces barriers for people with substance use addiction

The Williams Lake Substance Use Connections team helps individuals navigate the comprehensive system of mental health and substance use services. They create a supportive and accessible environment for people to find the help they need, whether seeking care at the hospital or in the community. Depending on individual needs, support may be delivered through admission and/or referrals to treatment, or when individuals are ready to transition to community-level care. There is no cost or referral process required to talk with a Substance Use Connections team member, seven days a week.

Williams Lake Urgent and Primary Care Centre expands care access

The opening of the Urgent and Primary Care Centre (UPCC) in early 2025 marks a major step in improving access to same-day, urgent primary health care. The centre is helping more people get the care they need, when they need it. A key feature of the UPCC is its dedicated smudging space—the first of its kind in the Interior—reflecting a strong commitment to culturally safe care. Integrating Indigenous practices and perspectives into health services across the South Cariboo is a priority for Interior Health and an important part of an ongoing journey toward reconciliation. OMH renovation and equipment investments improve accessibility, comfort

Expansion and accessibility improvements to three inpatient washrooms at 100 Mile District General Hospital provide improved conditions for patients managing mobility issues as well as for the staff who are more easily able to assist them. Upgrades to the HVAC system at the hospital in 2025 are also improving air quality, energy efficiency and allowing for more comfortable temperatures for patients, visitors and staff.
