Neonatal Education and Specialty Training (NEST) Program

The Interior Health neonatal training program is a blended learning program that enables RNs to work in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit. The Maternal, Newborn, Child and Youth Network and the Professional Practice Office have jointly approved the program to satisfy the advanced preparation required within the neonatal specialty.

The program is a blend of part-time study (12 weeks) and full time training (12 weeks) with a systematic integration of online and face-to-face learning, aimed to facilitate critical thinking within the context of neonatal care. The program uses a standardized, evidence informed online curriculum offered by the Association of Women's Health, Obstetric and Neonatal Nurses (AWHONN) called the Neonatal Orientation and Education Program (NOEP), the Acute Care of at-Risk Newborns (ACoRN), the University of British Columbia's Kangaroo Care and Perinatal Substance Use, SafeCare Level 1 and Step 2 Breastfeeding Essentials. *Neonatal Resuscitation Program within 2 years.

NEST has three components: theory, lab and preceptorship
