| Perioperative Team | Encompasses a multidisciplinary team including surgeons, anesthesiologist, gastroenterologists, surgical assistants, nurses, anesthesia assistants, perfusionists, technicians, surgical residents and other personnel present and participating in patient care during a surgical/endoscopic procedure within facilities operated by Interior Health. |
